UUFLB Supports the Peacemaking Statement of Conscience

The congregation directs our General Assembly delegates to present our views. Our congregation responded to the Parish Poll on the "Where We Stand" portion of the Statement with either "Agree" or "Strongly Agree" on each issue with the following exception: Some concern was expressed about advocating humanitarian intervention only when authorized by the United Nations. This was not due to a lack of support for the United Nations, but because agreement for action is difficult to achieve in either the General Assembly or the Security Council.

Statements of Conscience Do Make A Difference

After a Statement of Conscience is adopted, UU congregations can educate, advocate, and act in support of the issue. UUA President Sinkford has called our attention to our position on immigration: ". . . Racism has blinded many Americans to what takes place in our own kitchens, workshops, and fields. For our nation to be whole, we must acknowledge that our lives of privilege are supported in thousands of ways by people whose labor is invisible and whose suffering is hidden."

Our immigration system is broken. Families wait for years before being unified. Labor rights are eroded by our flawed guest worker programs. There exists no path to citizenship for the 12 million immigrants working and living within U.S. borders.

Since our first UU General Assembly in 1961 Resolutions/Statements of Conscience have been passed calling for immigration reform. As late as 2007 the General Assembly passed Actions of Immediate Witness in support of immigrant communities, including a call for an immediate moratorium on federal raids and resulting deportations.

Each GA features an interesting speaker at an event called the Ware Lecture. This year the lecturer will be Melissa Harris-Lacewell, Associate Professor of Politics and African-American Studies at Princeton University. It's not too late to register. The cost is now \$325, and you have until June 12 to get your registration to Boston. The form is online to download and print, or you may register online. Registration is also available onsite at the Salt Palace Convention Center in Salt Lake City June 23 – 28. Don't forget, the next president of the Unitarian Universalist Association will be elected at GA this year. No matter who is elected, it will be historic. We will elect either a woman or a Latino to lead a main-stream denomination. It promises to be an exciting time!

There are two candidates for President, the Reverend Laurel Hallman and the Reverend Peter Morales. There is information about both candidates on the back table in the sanctuary. Each month, a question will be posed to both candidates and their answers will be posted at www.uua.org/aboutus/governance/elections/president/questions/ The questions and answers will also be available in the Family Room and on the back table. The questions and answers there are fascinating. So are the comments by others. Be an informed voter. You can determine how your delegates vote if you know about the two fine ministers running for president. Let your delegates know what you think!

Gini Courter, the current Moderator, has placed her name in candidacy to continue in that position. She's done an excellent job and should be re-elected without a problem. Even if we don't have our full contingent of delegates at GA, we can still cast our full vote. Absentee ballots are available to us to fill our quota of votes. The delegates who go can be directed how to vote by the congregation or the Board of Trustees or they may be left undirected and vote their consciences.

Even though the absentee balloting for the UUA elections is available, you are still encouraged to consider attending GA and being a delegate. There is no other programming during Plenary Sessions so you won't miss any seminars or workshops to attend a Plenary. Besides, those Plenaries can get quite lively! There are mini-plenaries for the Statement of Conscience and hearings for Actions of Immediate Witness as well as the main Plenaries. It's amazing how many things UUs can find to debate on every subject. Debate is strictly timed, though, or GA would never end!

District Assembly (DA) News

Yes, there is District Assembly news from the 2009 DA this past month. In addition to the enriching workshops and worship there were exhibits of various organizations that fit our way of being. The best exhibit was in "Family Diversity" called **Love Makes a Family**. This was a very moving experience which involved photos and descriptions of families of every making, including same sex families and families created by transgender parents. There is joy, and yet in some cases the stories are heartbreaking. I added our Fellowship to the list of congregations wanting the exhibit, and we have just learned that UUFLB will host **Love Makes a Family** in December! We will receive it around December 1 from Orange Coast UU Church with assistance from Barbara Williams-Pemberton and First Church San Diego will transport it to San Diego sometime around January 1, 2010. The Assembly decided that the **2010 DA will be in Santa Barbara**, at the Unitarian Universalist church and it will be held all in one day. The opening celebration will be on Friday and everything else will be on Saturday. If attendees wish, they may participate in services at the SB church on Sunday. The 2011 DA is planned for a full weekend, although we will no longer have Saturday Banquet.

What Does That Acronym Mean?

CGEP (Charitable Gift and Estate Planning): The UUA office, in the Stewardship and Development staff group, that helps people include the UUA in their estate or charitable giving plans. Rather like our own Endowment Committee, isn't it?

BOT (Board of Trustees of the UUA): Made up of elected representatives from each of the 20 UUA districts, 3 at-large trustees, 1 youth trustee, 1 youth observer, the UUA President, the UUA Moderator, the Financial Advisor and Vice President of Finance, and the Board secretary.

The Mission Statement for the Unitarian Universalist Association Board of Trustees is : "Guided by the vision embodied in the Purposes and Principles of the UUA and in anti-racist imperatives approved by previous Boards, the mission of the Board of Trustees of the UUA includes but is not limited to: - Creation of goals for the Association, in cooperation with the General Assembly, administration, and our constituents; - Establishment of policies for the Association, guided by those goals; Empowerment of our member congregations through Board leadership in cooperation with the UUA administration, staff, and volunteers; Modeling of UU values in our lives and in our roles as Trustees; Stewardship in developing and managing the resources of the UUA."

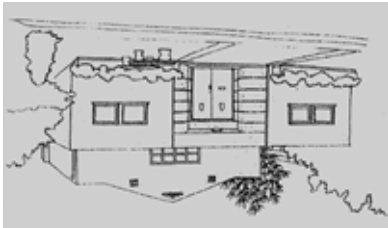
