May 2 Eradicating Our Sunkist Memories, Gustavo Arellano, Guest Speaker
Orange County author and columnist, Gustavo Arellano, will talk about how "truth" is whitewashed in Orange County, California, from the history books to the ballot box, from city names to anti-immigrant protestors who nevertheless have Mexican nannies.

May 9 Mothers Acting for Peace, Reverend Kent Doss
This Sunday we celebrate all those amazing people who have nurtured us and brought more life into our world. Mother's Day was strongly promoted by Anna Jarvis to fulfill her late mother's wish for a day set aside to honor all mothers. We continue that tradition by celebrating the amazing women of all walks of life who manifest peace and goodness in their activism and in their daily lives.

May 16 The Limits of Democracy, Reverend Kent Doss
One of our highest principles as UUs is the right and responsibility of a community to govern itself through fair, representative democracy, however there are some limits to that ideal. Our country was premised on a constitutional democracy -- a set of fundamental truths, privileges and rights within which our democracy is guided. Without those fundamental principles, our country might never have evolved ethically or morally. This Sunday we will look at the value of democracy, and its limits.

May 23 Vanity of Vanities, Reverend Kent Doss
A popular book called The Secret, the Protestant work ethic, and our basic sense of fairness lead us to believe that good things happen to good people. Sometimes that just isn't true. This Sunday we will explore the motivation for being good when there is no guarantee that our efforts will be rewarded. We will also look at the Old Testament book of Ecclesiastes for some gems of wisdom and comfort.

May 30 Replacing Orthodoxy, Reverend Kent Doss
We strive to be a community of diverse beliefs; we aim to honor the differences among us. What does it mean for a religious community to let go of "orthodoxy" or right belief, and replace it with a conversation? What does it mean for our tradition to encourage a journey of spiritual growth rather than claiming to offer The Truth? This Sunday we explore the role of Truth and truth-seeking in our lives.

June 6 Our Friends with Fur, Feathers, and Scales, Reverend Kent Doss
This Sunday we celebrate the interdependent web of life by reflecting on our relationships with animals. Many of us have pets, and each of us has been impressed at some time by a non-human creature. There is so much to learn from our fellow animals about the world we share. This Sunday we will draw on the symbolism of religious traditions, as well as our own deep feelings of compassion for our non-human friends.
Blessing of the Animals" - 5:00-5:30 pm - Bring your pet, or a picture of your pet to receive a blessing. We will gather for a short ritual to bless all of our animal friends on the front patio at UUFLB.

Message From Your Minister

I often describe Unitarian Universalism as covenantal rather than creedal. When I say we are a covenantal rather than creedal religious tradition, I mean that rather than a set of theological beliefs we all share in common, we are bonded by a common commitment to treat each other with respect as we strengthen our community. At its most basic, a covenant is an agreement about how a group of people will treat one another. But there are a few important details that make covenants especially important to Unitarian Universalism.

First, covenants are the historical basis of how we organize our congregations. Imagine North America in the mid 1600s with colonial governments and small religious groups popping up all over the place. There were some orderly Anglican churches, but also an array of small Puritan and Congregational churches. Each had their own slightly different theology and way of governing themselves. In 1648 the government of Massachusetts called for some sense of order amongst these churches. As a response, the Cambridge Platform was written.

That document, the Cambridge Platform, became the blueprint that we still largely follow today. It included the right of each parish to call its own minister, to control its own property and funds, and to determine criteria for church membership. Those new American religious communities used covenants as a simple document for members to agree on how they would treat each other. They were written and signed by all the members of each congregation and they reflected the simple promises that members made to one another and to God.

That brings me to the second important detail of covenants in our tradition. A covenant is more than a simple agreement between individuals because it calls on our highest ideals. For historical Unitarians, that meant God; for many of us today, that means appealing to our sense of justice, love and goodness. Covenants are not just about the people making them; they are intended to be an embodiment of our highest principles.

At the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Laguna Beach, we are bound together by a sense of covenant. We are here to build a supportive community, and we expect each person to be respectful of others. Covenant is the core of who we are, and it's a great platform from which to grow into the Beloved Community that I know is our future.

Social Action News

Your Social Action committee has had two primary objectives in the past weeks. First, it was the anniversary of the invasion of Iraq, and one of our members, Diane Morris, flew to Washington with her son to participate in the peace demonstration there. To support her efforts, members of our congregation went to Main Beach that same Saturday for the weekly demonstration (see their picture on the back of the calendar.) To follow up, our Fellowship hosted Ret. Col. Ann Wright in an inspirational town meeting during which she aired her impassioned views on ending military involvement in the Iraq and Afghanistan.

Second, an all-out effort was made to call our Senators and Representatives encouraging them to support Health Care Reform. Many of us called many times, also including Rep. Loretta Sanchez. Our two Senators and Rep. Sanchez came through! As a follow up, we have signed cards which have been sent to them, thanking them for listening to our calls. Looking ahead, we continue to educate about the environment, immigration, and prison reform. On May 2 we are honored by having Gustavo Arellano in our pulpit. This distinguished columnist will speak to us about the people whose lives and the lives of their children are intimately bound by the results of the debate over immigration reform. On July 18 Professor Joie Jones returns to an appreciative audience to speak more about his work with the United Nations, concentrating this time on the effect of politics on the global warming debate. Finally, on August 8, Mona Lynch will be speaking about prison reform.

Town Hall Meeting on Tuesday, May 18, 7-9pm at the Fellowship Hall

Heart Disease and Cancer: Scientific Studies in Prevention and Reversal

This presentation will be given by health educator Sylvester Johnson (Ph.D. Applied Physics). Sylvester will describe research about food's impact on cancer and heart disease, suggesting that health can be supported by consuming mainly unrefined plant-sourced foods. After eating these foods for many years, Sylvester feels that he's discovered the fountain of ...extended middle age. This is an educational opportunity tied to our still pending Statement of Conscience, "Ethical Eating."

A New Book for UUs....And Others

Rev. Chris Schriener, who served for 12 years as minister of our Fellowship, has completed a new book, *Do Think Twice: Provocative Reflections on Age-Old Questions*. In writing this book, Chris has attempted to approach familiar topics in unusual and creative ways. He discusses core values, "neurotheology," personal identity, free will, religious revelations, the mystery of consciousness, Biblical literalism, theism vs. atheism, accepting mortality, the limits of our knowledge, and the mismatch between human nature and the modern world. We are concluding our Curriculum *Carry the Flame*; a Self-Discovery and Religious Identity Program for UU Youth. Each section in *Carry the Flame* offers activities that relate to one of the seven principles of the Unitarian Universalist Association. This curriculum is designed to expand each child's level of self-awareness, spirituality, and religious identity. It is fun and educational at the same time ... Try not to let your children miss Sunday at UUFLB!

In April the children continued working on the Principles of Unitarianism Universalism through discussion and workbooks. They have been learning from each other and exploring ideas of how to apply what they have learned to their everyday lives.

In March for Social and Earth Justice the children planted flowers to help Tucker Wildlife Sanctuary in Majeska Canyon. These plants are starters that will be delivered and planted in the environment. They will help provide food for the insects to help balance the need for other birds and animals whom feed on these insects. The Reverend Henry Lucas was born in 1610 and served as a Member of Parliament for Cambridge University, 1639 -1640. Upon his death, in 1663, he bequeathed his collection of 4,000 books to the University Library at Cambridge – including a 1632 edition of Galileo’s Dialogo – and enough land to produce an income of 100 pounds per year, which was to be used to fund a professorship in “mathematick”. This provision for a professorship has continued and evolved to become the most prestigious endowed professorship in all of academia – the Lucasian Professorship of Mathematics, which was held by Sir Isaac Newton from 1669 - 1701 and by Stephen Hawkins from 1979 - 2008.



From this simple bequest, a huge benefit was created! Circle of Light

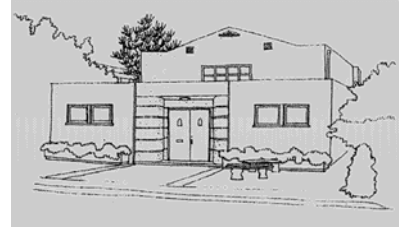
